

Ellen Thomson attended a "Death Café" webinar on Zoom on March 17 led by Kathy Douglas. This was an interesting evening. The format was conversational – talking about with whom and how we have experienced death; as well as

sharing our emotional reaction(s) to death. We were asked to think about what we want to do before we die. In the breakout group there was a palliative care worker who expressed her love for her work. During COVID-19 she indicated that grieving has been interrupted. She stressed that living a life well is most important. The dash between birth – death, is the story of life. She refers to 'death' as Holy Mystery. During this time there is a great sadness and loneliness because seniors are isolated from family members. More people are asking for medical assisted dying. When COVID ends she feels that there will be a collective need to grieve.

Rockwood Stone Finance & Stewardship

The committee met on April 15, with Rockwood and Stone Trustees and Tomas Rincon of Frontier Capital to better understand Frontier's Canoe Funds that were developed for United Church congregations and members. These funds follow United Church investment guidelines being 97%

compliant with environmental and social investing.

Reports were received from our Treasurers. It was noted that our Secretary Sharyn Southworth is very happy with the new laptop. The software for it was licensed through Tech Soup to Stone. The committee agreed to pay for Heather Leffler's Zoom license for 2021. We will purchase a license for the pastoral charge when we move back to worshipping in our churches but want to keep sign in consistent for the time being.

We continue to seek ways to Inspire, Invite and Thank our congregations for their gifts of time, talent and treasure. Bill Allen and Amanda Hunter-Anthony were thanked for the inspiring letters of thanks, they included with the 2020 income tax receipts.

Bill Allen, Brian Mack, Heather Leffler and Sherol Steinberg took part in a Called to be the Church: The Journey workshop with Dave Jagger. The group's assignment of writing a Case for Support showing what we are doing in our churches became our Christmas flyer. The Stewardship Analysis Report we received was shared with the committee. Dave recommended having a narrative budget to identify how givings are used in relation to areas of ministry such as worship, faith formation, pastoral care etc. Another recommendation is that we develop legacy giving and gift acceptance policies.

Stone Property & Finance

Instead of our Annual Beef Dinner in October Marg Baker, Liz Guthrie, Edie Ward and Barb Parker planned a series of takeout dinners. Dinners planned for April and May 2021 were not held due to restrictions. They are still planning on having them during the late spring and early summer months.

Volunteers painted the panelling in the Jeannie Jackson room after renovations were completed. When the weather gets warmer the items for this room (which are presently being stored in the Sanctuary) will be put back.

Kitchen was inspected by Public Health on December 11, 2020 and passed. We were advised no water samples need to be done until takeout dinners resume. A water sample was taken and passed March 24 prior to our planned April dinner which did not happen due to restrictions.

We are in the process of checking our insurance coverage. The church has been appraised to make sure that our coverage is adequate.

The Maple Syrup fundraiser was another success. 280 gallons of syrup were purchased. Thanks to all who ordered syrup and to those who picked up and delivered it. A total of \$3,586 was raised and will offset the cost of fuel costs for the year.

Thanks to Don Martin and Tom Parker for requesting quotes for insulation and cladding of the back room. HFH was the successful bidder and the work was completed in March.

An insulation grant was applied for through the United Possibilities Fund – formerly Waterloo Presbytery Extension Council. We received \$4,000.00.

Financial Update - Submitted by Bill Allen

With the in-person church services closed down, electricity and heating costs are lower than usual. However, weekly offerings are reduced as well. Also, insurance costs have increased significantly this year. We are currently running an operational deficit of \$4,890. As noted above, maple syrup sales netted \$3,586 which is \$335 more than last year.

On the good news front, we have strong financial reserves with \$60,000 in our current account and a short-term GIC. Thank you to the PAR givers and those mailing in regular monthly cheques. Your support ensures our minister and church members continue to provide local and outreach activities for our community. A reminder that givings cheques can be mailed to **Stone United Church, P.O. Rockwood Property & Finance

House of Joy: Work has proceeded on the site plan for the repurposed house property. As with everything in the time of COVID, it has been a challenge to keep timelines moving smoothly. Engineers have completed a site plan that received approval in principle from the Township and MTO at a pre-approval meeting. At that time, the Township also asked that a Landscape Architect Plan be submitted showing what will be done with the remaining green space. If all goes as planned, we should receive permission within four weeks of submission. Thanks to Darryl Nichol for his work moving this forward.

We will be moving the generator and having it installed by Day Hall. The Hall can then be used for emergency shelter in case of power outages. In addition, under consideration: sale and/re purposing of items from the house prior to demolition and working with fire department to allow for the house to be used for training purposes.

Church: The committee has put a hold on most expenditures until the Church has received approvals from the Township for demolition and construction on the house lot.

We will be looking at prioritizing needed renovations vs improvements. We are also looking at having an engineer/architect who is experienced working with historical buildings to do plans/recommendations based on what is needed-including accessibility updates (including but not limited to sound/lights/physical accessibility), so the church can create a staged plan that is practical and keeps the historical flavour of the building while making it more user friendly.

Bullas Glass has been contacted regarding the stained-glass window over the front door which seems to have shifted and will also be requesting they examine other windows for rejuvenation of the frames and plexiglass outer windows.

The fans in the sanctuary will need replacing (not all speeds work currently) but they are functional for now.

Kevin Anthony and Roy Steinberg did the snow clearing throughout the winter, with Darryl Nichol chipping in at the end of the snow season. Much thanks to all!

At Christmas, the Committee with the help of Lou, Ollie, Al Jay, Liam and Cees decorated outside the church. Thank you to Kevin who constructed an amazing creche that will be great to use for many years and thank you to Aaron Best who brought the creche to the church on a flat bed after it became too big to fit on a pickup. Thank you to Christine Wenger who allowed us to chop down a tree and Ray Thomson for providing straw bales. Thank you to Heather for the JOY that made a simple statement that touched many. Thank you to those in the congregation who dropped by and put-up decorations. The birds and squirrels have personally requested more popcorn strings and birch bark feeders for next year! We had positive feedback from church members and the community and left it up through February as a result of that feedback. There were community members who came and sat on the bench daily in the evening to have a peaceful moment.

Church Use: Church rentals and use have been suspended during shutdown. While in red zone, AA was allowed to meet with limited numbers. We have provided them with strict protocols that support the Provincial and Public Health protocols in order to keep everyone safe.

All rentals/users will be considered on a case-tocase basis, but we do not anticipate any further users at this time.

All who enter the church must contact sherol@rockwoodfc.com prior to entering to ensure that traffic in and out of the building is managed safely. All must fill out the contact forms by the door and follow the posted protocols.

Finances: Rockwood United Church is showing a \$4,172.87 operating deficit. There are 23 families enrolled in PAR with monies deposited on the 20th of every month and one weekly e-transfer, the continuing support of the life and work of the church is appreciated. While we are not able to meet in person, we still have bills to pay. The current balance of the General Fund is \$550.

There will be a transfer in from the trustees to cover the site plan expenditures that have already been paid. The Committee has been heading the Breakfast for Dinner fundraiser while we are unable to have the Country Breakfast. Thank you to all who provided food or bid on an offering, with all monies going to the General Fund. We will be doing a fundraiser in June taking orders for home made sausages, butter tarts, lemon tarts and chocolate chip cookies-stay tuned to the announcements.

Rockwood Trustees

The Trustees and Sherol Steinberg, Council/Property and Finance Chairperson met on Zoom on January 13. Darryl Nichol reported that we have entered an Engineering Services Agreement with GM Blue Plan Engineering for an estimated budget of \$13,563 to cover:

- Completion of Topographical Survey and Base
- Preparation of Conceptual Parking Lot Layout
- · Completion of Site Grading and Servicing Plan
- Completion of a Stormwater Management Design Report
- Site Plan Submission and SP meeting with Township
- Coordination with Township, County and MTO

Sherol noted that the Council had been polled and supported our proposal to withdraw funds from our investment to cover expenses for selling the existing parking lot and developing the new one. It was decided to withdraw \$10,000 on May 5.

Rosslyn Bentley joined the Stone Trustees and Property and Finance Committee to meet with Tomas Rincon of Frontier Capital to further explain their Canoe Funds which have been developed for United Churches.

Rockwood Outreach

Mission and Service

We appear to be on track to meet our 2021 target of \$12000. We appreciate the M&S videos that Heather presents on a monthly basis. During Lent they were shown weekly along with information and statistics about the scope of M&S both at home and worldwide.

Anishnabeg Outreach

We have donated a large quantity of clothing and footwear this year as well as quilts and homemade blankets.

Women in Crisis / Rural Women's Support Program

Thanks to the generous donation from The Rockwood Lionesses, via Ollie Darcie, we added \$1000 to the \$2000 previously allocated to support this agency. It was very gratefully received.

EWCS Food Bank

We plan a freezer fill when the current lock-down is over and they have additional room in their freezer.

We continue to try to come up fundraising ideas despite the restrictions imposed by COVID. To this end we resurrected the Food Fix for February, March, April and May and we are once again grateful to our determined food-loving folk that came through again. Our four offerings made over \$1500. n July we are planning to prepare and sell a limited number of take-out picnics featuring whole roast chickens, salads and fruit pies. We are incubating ideas for a pre-Christmas offering, including gift packaged preserves and festive arrangements

Rockwood Stone Ministry and Personnel

The Ministry and Personnel Committee met on May 6, 2021 at 7:30 pm via zoom. Committee members were reminded that many of us take on multiple roles within our individual churches and at the Pastoral Charge Board level given the size of our congregations. As a result, we have developed the practice of declaring a conflict of interest when appropriate or inviting another member to declare when there is a conflict or perceived conflict of interest.

Following a review of the terms of reference for the committee which were adopted by the Pastoral Charge Board on June 6, 2020, Reverend Leffler was invited to share her 2021 goals with the committee. Those goals are as follows – to continue to engage with our children and youth outside of Sunday mornings; to work with our Discernment Circles and Committees to build on the learnings from the pandemic; and to help us find safe ways to re-connect.

Brian Mack and Ellen Thomson reported briefly on the regional M & P workshops that they attended in November and March respectively via zoom. Committee members were encouraged to take advantage of these workshops in future.

Rev. Leffler was thanked for her innovative work over the course of the past year. Rosslyn Bentley's many contributions as chairperson and recording secretary for a number of years were acknowledged. Brian Mack will be Chairperson for 2021 and Ellen Thomson will be the recording secretary.
